



WHAT IS NTTC?

National Tank Truck Carriers (NTTC) represents the tank truck industry before Congress and various Federal agencies, including the Department of Transportation, Environmental Protection Agency, and OSHA. NTTC provides its members information on legislative, regulatory, and operational developments that affect their businesses. The Association also serves as an industry spokesman and resource to carriers, shippers, regulators, the news media, financial community, and the general public.

NTTC carrier members include companies that transport bulk materials by highway for compensation in tank trailers, dry bulk trailers, and intermodal containers. Commodities transported include petroleum products, chemicals, acids, liquid wastes, compressed gases, food products and dry bulk materials such as cement, flour and plastic pellets. NTTC Associate Members include companies that provide equipment and services to the tank truck industry, and also include shippers and private carriers.

WHY SHOULD I BECOME A CARRIER MEMBER?

NTTC has represented the tank truck industry for over 50 years. The organization's *effectiveness lies in the strength of its membership*. Today, NTTC has over 200 carrier members from the U.S., Canada, Mexico, and several other countries. NTTC members range in size from small family-owned niche market carriers to large publicly traded companies with international operations. NTTC's 200 Associate members are involved in developing NTTC positions on important issues and provide information to carrier members through meetings and publications.

National Tank Truck Carriers is the only national organization that focuses on issues that are unique to the tank truck industry. These issues include such things as regulations governing cargo tank design, maintenance and operations, special laws covering tank truck drivers, tank truck cleaning and effluent disposal, and hazardous materials related subjects involving federal, state, and local governments.

NTTC provides information and assistance to its members through a monthly newsletter, detailed membership letters on tank truck specific subjects, board-meeting minutes, a variety of tank truck

oriented meetings, and direct contact with its experienced Washington staff.

NTTC publications include the Cargo Tank Hazardous Material Regulations Book, Membership Directory, Mutual Aid Information Book, Cargo Tank Maintenance Manual, and Tank Truck Drivers Handbook. It also has developed a Hazardous Materials Information System training program that is available on video and CD-ROM. *NTTC members receive discounts on all publications and products.*

NTTC conducts an Annual Tank Truck Safety Contest that recognizes the safety accomplishments of member carriers from a wide range of mileage categories. Contest winners earn plaques and industry recognition.

As a membership-driven association, NTTC carrier-elected officers discuss and establish policies on important tank truck issues at the Winter and Summer board of Directors Meetings and at the Annual May Conference and Equipment Show. It has active tank truck safety and tank truck cleaning councils that meet regularly, and sponsors the only Tank Truck Maintenance Conference and Equipment Show in the country. Special meetings are held whenever time-sensitive issues arise that could impact the tank truck industry.

NTTC also works closely with several other industry associations, including the Truck Trailer Manufacturers Association, American Trucking Associations, Chemical Manufacturers Association, American Petroleum Institute, and Propane Gas Association. NTTC staff members serve on committees of the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance, Hazardous Materials Advisory Council, TRANSCAER Steering Committee, and the U. S. Department of Transportation's Cooperative Hazardous Materials Enforcement Development (COHMED).

Carrier Member dues are based on annual tank truck revenues. *Membership in any other organization is not a prerequisite for joining NTTC.*

METHOD OF BILLING

Tank truck operator membership dues are assessed on the basis of the previous calendar year's total gross revenue from tank truck operations for each member carrier or group of carriers having common ownership. Annual dues are due and payable (US dollars) on April 1 of each year and quarterly dues are due and payable April 1, July 1, October 1, and January 1. International carriers' annual dues are the larger of: (1) \$250 per each \$10 million of tank truck revenue (on domestic operations) for the previous year; or, (2) based upon the schedule below on revenue from their US operations; or, (3) \$275.
